Understanding your Program Structure







Graduate with a Bachelor of Criminology and Criminal Justice

Three years full time or part time equivalent

Complete 48 units comprising:

28 units for all BCCJ Core Courses, and

4 units from BCCJ Flexible Core Courses, and

16 units from BCCJ Elective Courses

- Selected courses must include at most 24 units at level 1.
- First 4 units must be courses from the BCCJ Core Courses or BCCJ Flexible Core Courses sections.






