

Transferring from the BCCJ to another UQ degree

Information for domestic students planning to transfer from Bachelor of Criminology and Criminal Justice (BCCJ) to

Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Laws (Honours) (BA/LLB(Hons)) or **Bachelor of Laws (Honours) (LLB(Hons))**

The sample enrolment plan below is for students who are studying in the Bachelor of Criminology and Criminal Justice (BCCJ) in 2025 who hope to:

- transfer into the Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Laws (Honours) in 2026; or
- transfer into the Bachelor of Laws (Honours) in 2026.

Please note that the Bachelor of Laws (Honours) (and associated dual programs) do not have a Semester 2 admission and therefore you will not be able to change prior to Semester 1 of the following year.

This plan has been approved by the Faculty of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences, and the Faculty of Business, Economics and Law and is intended as a guide only. The suggested courses are not compulsory, and many others are available.

Remember:

- You must satisfy subject prerequisites AND obtain grades that will derive the required ATAR/entry rank for the *relevant program*. These are often best achieved by enrolling in courses you enjoy and therefore should consider your choices carefully. You may wish to contact UQ Admissions to discuss how your entry rank will be calculated on the basis of your academic history.
- If you are intending to change programs in 2026, you should familiarise themselves with all relevant rules and procedures. More information is available from:

NOTE: If planning to transfer to the BA/LLB(Hons) dual degree, you should choose BCCJ general electives that align with your intended BA majors to ensure maximum credit as there is no room for general electives in the dual program. BCCJ Core courses may be eligible for credit into the BA Criminology major or the BA Legal Education Studies major.

If successful in securing a place in the single Bachelor of Laws (Honours) program, you may request 8 to 16 units credit from General Elective Courses. Please contact bel@uq.edu.au for further information.

***LAWS1110 is incompatible with the Bachelor of Laws (Honours) and the Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Laws (Honours). If you complete this course whilst enrolled in the BCCJ, you will not receive credit for it towards the LLB(Hons) or BA/LLB(Hons).**
