Program Structure in Advanced Humanities (Honours)

- Interdisciplinary Core Courses
- Specialism in a study area (major or extended major)
- Elective choice
- Honours Field of Study

To Note (Advanced Humanities students only):

• You can only complete 24 units (12 courses) at level 1.

Be careful with the number of level 1 program electives and general electives you take.

• **General Electives** can comprise courses from any other undergraduate program at UQ providing those courses are not restricted or have firm pre-requisite requirements.

Other Advanced Humanities or Bachelor of Arts courses are usually good complements.

You do not need to declare your major/extended major now.

You can declare or change your major/extended major, through mySI-net. mySI-net refers to majors/extended majors as 'plans'.

• **Progressing into research honours** in year 4 is dependent on achieving a minimum GPA of 5.5 across all courses that contribute to the Major or Extended Major for which you will be taking honours.

* Entry into the **Western Civilisation** extended major is via QTAC application only. Advanced Humanities students cannot change into this plan via mySI-net.

^ Variations:

- If taking two majors, this can be another level 1 compulsory course for the other major.
- This could be a Program Elective Course if taking only one major.

Example Student:

Georgia thinks she wants to major in Ancient History, but also would like to pursue a foreign language. She also thinks that she might like to major in Philosophy either in addition to or instead of Ancient History.

Diploma in Languages

- An additional qualification.
- 16 units (8 courses) comprising -
 - 1 Major, or
 - \circ 2 Minors.
- Taken concurrently with the BAdvHum(Hons) or BHum/LLB(Hons).
- By 'overloading' (enrolling in 5 course rather than 4) each semester, both programs may be completed with no additional time.

General Electives (BAdvHum(Hons) only) Your general electives may comprise Language courses.






