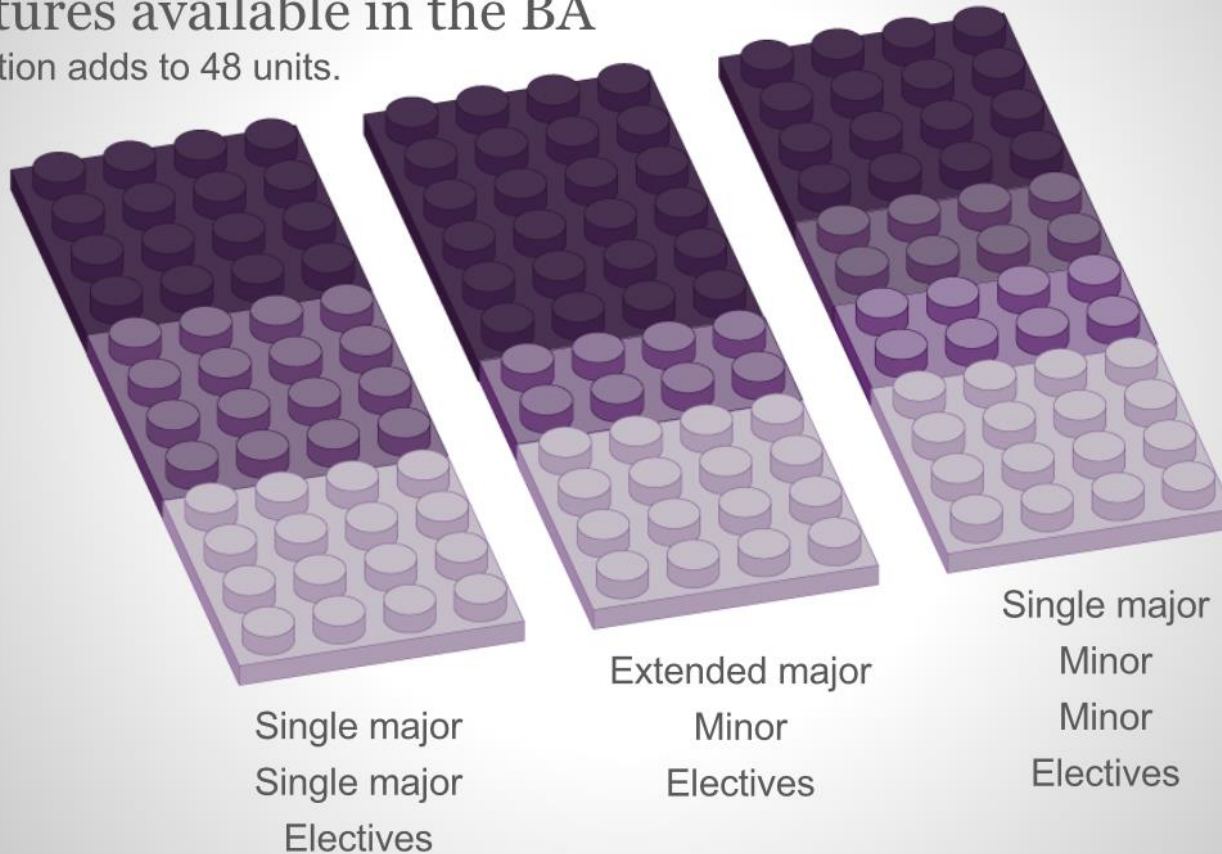

Structures available in the BA

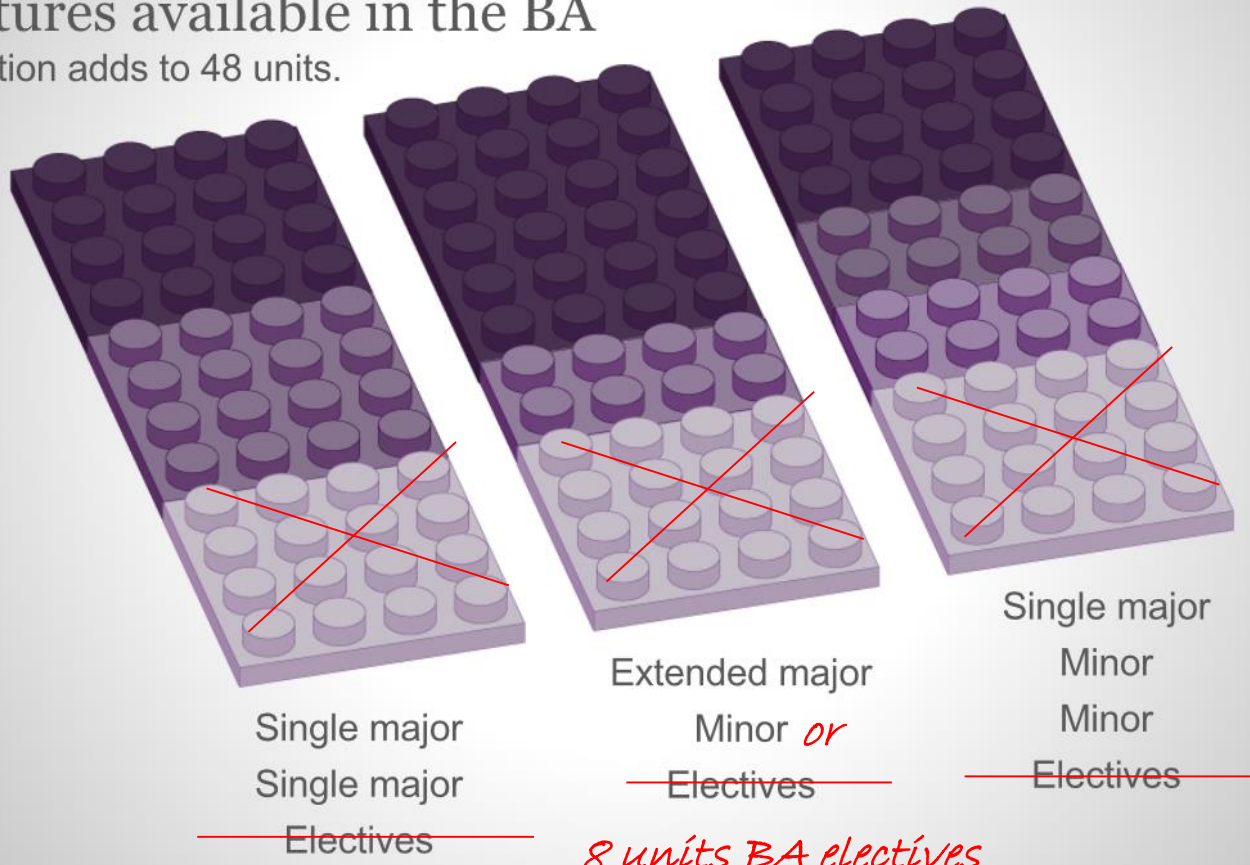

Course Description: This course equips students with the conceptual tools for better understanding the changing nature of modern international relations. Topics covered include the 'traditional agenda' of war and peace, state sovereignty, nationalism, insecurity and war, nuclear weapons, international law, and the just war tradition; and the 'new agenda' of global governance and globalisation, non-state actors, terrorism, human rights and humanitarian intervention.

1.2 Course Introduction

International relations is one of the most complex and intellectually exciting domains of human social interaction. The study of international relations has traditionally focused on interactions between sovereign states, with an emphasis on why states go to war and the conditions favouring interstate cooperation. Issues on the 'traditional agenda' remain crucially important. However, as the world has become politically, economically, socially and ecologically more interdependent, scholars have devoted more attention to a 'new agenda', which includes questions previously excluded from the study of international relations, either because they were deemed unimportant or irrelevant, or because they hadn't emerged as political realities. This course is designed to introduce students to the concepts and issues associated with each agenda, and to provide conceptual tools for students better to understand the changing nature of modern international relations.

This course begins by introducing students to the major theoretical perspectives in international relations, beginning with Liberal and Realism, then considering the more critical approaches of Marxism and Feminism. The course then explores issues associated with the 'traditional agenda' of international relations which was primarily concerned with questions of war and peace. This includes a focus on the main actors, sovereign states, nationalism, the sources of insecurity and war, the role of nuclear weapons, the evolution of international society and international law, and the historically significant Great War, interwar years and the Cold War. Finally, the course examines issues on the 'new agenda'. Sometimes this shift from the traditional to the new agenda is discussed in terms of a shift from international relations to a much broader world or global politics, where questions of war and peace no longer determine the focus of study. In this course, however, students will be encouraged to think about how the 'traditional' and 'new' agendas are related and the extent to which they overlap. The broader scope of the 'new agenda' extends to issues related to globalization and international political economy, global governance, human rights, the United Nations as an international organization facing an alleged crisis of legitimacy, the role of non-state actors, including terrorist groups, environmental challenges and the controversial claims surrounding an emerging norm of humanitarian intervention.

Course Changes in Response to Previous Student Feedback
