1. Welcome

What is applied linguistics?

- Applied Linguistics is the study of how languages are used, how they can be learned, and how they can best be taught.
- Understanding how languages are used is crucial in understanding human behaviour as we grow, live, work and interact with each other, whether in the home, school, work, or across international boundaries, cultures and customs.





What do applied linguists do?

- Applied Linguists are trained in the methods of capturing and analysing language in use, both qualitatively and quantitatively, so that we can better understand all aspects of how languages are used.
- Trained Applied Linguists are in high demand across research, teaching, business and technology sectors, with employment opportunities anywhere where languages are used, learned, and taught.

Employability

Applied linguistics students develop skills that are highly valued by employers:

- In-depth knowledge of all the main aspects of the structure and function of human languages generally
- ✓ Ability to analyze language data and solve problems relevant to language
- Broadly applicable and transferrable skills in engaging critically with unfamiliar analytical problems
- Excellent understanding of the issues involved in communication across languages and cultures
- Experience and skills in working collaboratively to solve problems





2. Understanding your program structure





Program overview

- The flagship degree is the Master of Applied Linguistics.
- This is a 2 year, 1.5 year or 1 year program, depending on your prior experience or specific program (e.g. GDUFS pathway).
- There are three 'options' regarding field of studies
 - No FOS take any electives, finish with degree in applied linguistics
 - TESOL FOS must take all four TESOL courses
 - Language and Discourse Analysis FOS – must take all four LaDA courses.

Master of Applied Linguistics (2 year)

 4 semesters (full-time) – 16 courses (4 per semester) OR 13 courses plus dissertation

Master of Applied Linguistics (1.5 year, depending on recognised prior learning)

 3 semesters (full-time) – 12 courses (4 per semester) OR 9 courses plus dissertation

Master of Applied Linguistics (1 year, depending on recognised prior learning)

• 2 semesters (full-time) – 8 courses (4 per semester) – NO dissertation.

Graduate Certificate (Applied Linguistics & TESOL) - 4 courses (1/2 year full-time)



2 year Program

All 2 year students commencing this semester MUST take the following *foundation* (part A) courses, and NO other courses

If you have already enrolled in other courses (e.g. SLAT7805, SLAT7806), please enrol in these four courses NOW and cancel your enrolments in the other courses.

(Domestic Australian Students may need to swap WRIT6001 with WRIT7035 (Sem 2 only) - E-mail me if you are confused about your status).

1.5 year Program

1.5 year program students commencing this semester should take the following courses.

- If you are a TESOL student, you MUST also take <u>one</u> of SLAT7835 or EDUC7032 this semester (you can do the one you don't do now in Sem 1 2023)
- If you are a LaDA student, you MUST take <u>one</u> of SLAT7829 or 7899 (you can do the one you don't do now in Sem 1 2023)

1 year Program

1 year program students commencing this semester should take the following courses.

- You should take SLAT7805 SLAT7826 this semester
- If you are a TESOL student, you MUST also take SLAT7835
 <u>AND</u> EDUC7032 this semester
- If you are a LaDA student, you MUST take SLAT7829 AND SLAT7899 this semester.

Dissertation

- Students on the 2 year or 1.5 year offerings (note, not GDUFS students) can apply to undertake a research dissertation, worth 6 units towards your degree program
- This is subject to having a GPA of 6.0, at least a 6 in the course SLAT7806 Research Methods, a coherent proposal of research, and the approval of a supervisor.
- Dr. Martin Schweinberger is the current coordinator of the dissertation course (SLAT7853) and will send out e-mails about applying for the dissertation component during the semester.
- It is a good idea to pay special attention to the key topics of importance in applied linguistics now, so that you can develop your proposal later.

Allocations vs enrolment

- From 2021, the course sign-on procedure changed to incorporate ALLOCATIONS for preferred tutorial groups, times and days.
- When you enrol onto a course, you are a member of that course if you received e-mails from the course coordinator, you ARE ENROLLED onto that course.
- However, being ALLOCATED a tutorial can take a little time when tutorials that are 'full'. This means we need to open a new tutorial group. Sometimes this can happen even after the semester has begun.
- PLEASE BE PATIENT regarding your allocations. If you are ENROLLED onto a course, you are fine! You can still access all course content on Blackboard and complete all tasks as normal. Do not e-mail the course coordinator in a panic that you aren't on the course. It just means your tutorial day/time is not finalised yet.



Allocations vs enrolment

- If you are allocated, the tutorial group will show up in your timetable.
- INTERNAL students: If you are not allocated, and the semester begins, kindly e-mail your course coordinator to see which tutorial might be OK to sit in until your allocation is complete.
- EXTERNAL students: If you are not allocated, and the semester begins, you may join any tutorial group until your allocation is complete.
- Both INTERNAL / EXTERNAL students: When your allocation is finally complete, you MUST attend the group you have finally been allocated to.



4. Settling into university life



INTERNAL vs EXTERNAL mode

- INTERNAL students can experience the full range of UQ activities on offer, include all welcome sessions, clubs, societies, and more.
- For EXTERNAL students, we understand that there are certain things that cannot be done online. We also understand that many of you will feel isolated from your peers, and your tutors.
- With very few exceptions, lectures, tutorials, special seminars and any in-class activities will be recorded
- Students who study together generally receive higher grades and report better experiences it is strongly suggested you quickly find study-buddies, either on campus or online.
- Online community support can be generated for each course (e.g. WECHAT, Facebook). However, these will be student-run, and course staff are <u>not</u> responsible for managing these.
- We can however distribute links or invitations to join student-run learning groups for each course.
- It is highly likely that external mode will be discontinued from Sem 2 2023 you will need to come to UQ to finish your studies (to be confirmed).
